- Combines knowledge of Catholic social thought and Pope Benedict's use of it in his political speeches with appreciation of the genuine goods espoused by secular politics and philosophy.
- Provides a profound challenge to those Catholics who would endorse an 'Integralist' position (that the Catholic faith should be the basis of public law and public policy within civil society) or pursue the Benedict Option (to embrace exile from the mainstream culture and construct a counterculture).


